

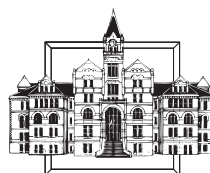

## PRIORITY REGISTRATION

Students in the traditional undergraduate program may complete their registration during Priority Registration Nov. 8-30, 2010.

## Registration Procedures

Each student must complete the following steps to be registered for classes.

### Step 1: Academic Advising

All students must meet with their academic advisor to select classes.

### Step 2: Registration

Students can take their signed registration form to the Office of the University Registrar. Students can also update any biographical changes that may have occurred (addresses, phone numbers, majors, etc) during this step.

### Step 3: Finances

- *Students whose Financial Aid covers all educational expenses:* Students applying for Financial Aid must go to the Financial Aid Office to complete their registration.
- *Students whose Financial Aid does not cover all educational expenses:* Students applying for Financial Aid must go to the Financial Aid Office to complete their registration.
- *Students not applying for Financial Aid:* Proceed to Step 4

### Step 4: Tuition and Fees

All students must go to the Student Account Services office to complete their registration. All tuition and fees must be paid or payment plans approved before the first day of the spring term. Payment can be made by cash, check, Mastercard, Visa, Discover and American Express. There is no automatic payment option. Even if financial aid fully covers your tuition and fees, you must still sign your Student Payment Agreement (SPA) in the Office of Student Account Services or Financial Aid yourself. All outstanding responsibilities in Students Accounts and

Financial Aid must be complete, including any indebtedness to the University, by the last day of 100 percent refund or the student will be withdrawn.

### Step 5: Student ID and Computer Access

Friends University students are required to have a Friends University photo identification card. Once you have received the new Friends University ID card, it will not expire, therefore you do not need a new one each semester, or each time you re-enroll. You may get your card in the Casado Campus Center at the Student Affairs Office. To receive or verify your Computer User ID and password for Friends e-mail and access to Moodle, visit the Information Services Department in the CAPS/IS Facility OR call the Help Desk at (316) 295-5767.

### Step 6: Bookstore Information

Textbooks may be purchased online at [www.friends.bkstr.com](http://www.friends.bkstr.com) or in the Bookstore after Dec. 20. Students who are eligible for Bookstore vouchers and do not complete the registration process by Dec. 17 must pick up their book voucher from the Financial Aid Office or Student Account Services.

### Step 7: You are finished when you have:

- A copy of your class schedule
- Left a signed original of your SPA at Financial Aid or Student Account Services. You keep a copy of your SPA.
- Completed all required financial arrangements and/or required payments. If you are uncertain, call Financial Aid at (316) 295-5200 or Student Account Services at (316) 295-5595 to confirm.
- If applicable, your student ID card, User ID and password.

## Enrollment Changes

1. Change in registration includes addition or cancellation of any courses, change in the number of credits, change from credit to auditor status or vice versa, or change in grade option.
2. No change in registration is official unless made in writing in the Office of the University Registrar or by mail.
3. Any registered student who does not officially drop a course is financially liable for the tuition and fees and receives a grade of "F."

### Dropping and Adding Classes:

To add or drop a class:

1. Pick up a form at the Office of the University Registrar (or at the information desk during final registration).
2. Fill out the form with complete information.
3. Obtain your advisor's signature.
4. Return the form to the Office of the University Registrar for computer input.

**Administrative Withdrawal** may be initiated by the appropriate office if a student:

1. Has failed to provide the documentation required by the University in order for the student to achieve full admission status. The student will have four weeks after the first day of classes to obtain all needed information.
2. Has failed to meet the University's basic standards for academic performance and/or progress.
3. Has failed to make payment of tuition and/or fees to the University in the manner, amount and at the time agreed upon between the student and the University's Student Account Services Office.
4. Has failed to meet the University's code of conduct or community life standards.

Standard refund policies will apply for the time attended. Each student has the right to petition in writing for an exception to any policy or regulation, including registration and deadlines. The petition may be denied, but students do have the right to question the policy as it regards their situation. Such written petitions should be addressed to the Exceptions Committee, c/o Office of the University Registrar.

**Complete Withdrawal:** If you find it necessary to completely withdraw from the University you must:

1. Obtain a complete withdrawal form from the Registrar's Office.
2. Complete the withdrawal form and obtain the necessary signatures.
3. Take the withdrawal form to the Office of the University Registrar for processing.

**Incompletes:** A student who has failed to fulfill all requirements of a course may petition the instructor before the close of the term to assign

the grade “I” (incomplete). The grade “I” is given only for personal emergencies which are verifiable and when the student has done passing work in the course. The responsibility for completing all course work rests with the student. The course extension petition, listing completion requirements and completion date will be signed by the student and the instructor. A “replacement grade” will also be assigned that will be the letter grade the student will receive if the missing work is not completed. The “I” will change to the replacement grade only if the “I” remains at the end of the semester for term-based classes (Fall or Spring) following the one in which the “I” was assigned. **Grade Change Policy:** All requests for a grade change must be initiated within one year of completing the course and prior to receiving the degree.

### **PAYMENT ARRANGEMENTS**

Friends University offers interest-free payment plans to assist the student who is unable to pay their total charges for the semester by the first day of the term. These payment plans allow you to make a down payment and then pay in four monthly payments over the semester and apply to tuition, fees, room and meals. Textbooks may not be included in the payment plans. Miscellaneous charges occurring during the semester will be billed monthly and are due and payable upon

receipt of the statement. There will be a \$40 set-up fee each semester for tuition payment plans.

Fall term payments will be due August through December and spring term payments will be due January through May. Payments must be received in the Business Office no later than the 20th day of each month. If payments are not made as agreed, the remaining balance becomes due in full and may be assessed finance charges at the rate of 10 percent per annum. For your convenience, you may arrange to have your payments electronically transferred from your checking or savings account, or you may automatically charge your payment to a credit card (VISA, MasterCard, Discover or American Express). There will be no additional charge for these options beyond the \$40 tuition payment plan fee. To estimate your monthly payments, you may simply:

- 1) total your costs for tuition, tuition payment plan fee, fees, room and board;
- 2) subtract estimated Financial Aid proceeds;
- 3) divide the remaining balance by five.

The resulting figure will represent the estimated amount of your payment. Please note that in order to finalize your enrollment process you must formalize this process in the Student Account Services Office.

**Fee Payment:** All tuition & fees are due and payable before the first day of classes. Any student unable to make payment in full before the first day of classes (including those students

whose financial aid has not arrived) must sign a payment agreement and make specific and satisfactory arrangements for payment with Student Account Services. This includes those students who receive tuition reimbursement from their employers. A person who has outstanding indebtedness to the University is not allowed to register, receive a transcript or record, have academic credits certified or receive a diploma until such indebtedness is satisfactorily cleared with Student Account Services.

**Credit Balance Refunds:** Students with a credit balance on account after payment of current enrollment charges with Title IV funds (federal PELL grants, student loans, etc.) will automatically be mailed refund checks within 10 working days. Refund checks for credit balances from payment with PLUS loans will be issued to parents. Financial Aid for the applicable enrollment period will not be credited to a student's account until enrollment has been finalized and all associated charges have been posted. No credit balances will be refunded until all current charges have been paid in full. To retain a credit balance on account to cover additional anticipated educational expenses, students must submit written requests (forms are available in the Student Account Services and Financial Aid Offices).

## FINANCIAL AID REQUIREMENTS

**Federal Programs:** Awards from Federal programs require an enrollment of 12 credit hours per semester in a standard term program for full-time status. Adjustments will be made to the awards if enrollment is less than 12 hours.

**State Programs:** Awards from State programs require an enrollment of 12 credit hours per semester in a standard term program.

**Institutional Programs:** Awards from Institutional programs require an enrollment of 12 credit hours per semester in the traditional undergraduate program.

**Standards of Progress:** A student must make satisfactory academic progress toward a certificate or degree to be eligible for financial aid. Friends University's policy for Standards of Progress is in accordance with Federal guidelines. Full-time students must earn a minimum number of credit hours in conjunction with number of years of enrollment as defined in the chart above. Part-time students will be expected to make the same proportional progress as full-time students. Students must earn a cumulative grade point average in accordance with academic classification. Students will maintain financial aid eligibility up to 186 attempted hours. Incompletes will not be counted as credit earned. One semester is allowed to finish incomplete work. Probation and suspension standards correspond to academic policies.

**Appeal Procedures:** If a student fails to meet the satisfactory academic progress requirements and believes unusual circumstances warrant a review, the student may make a written appeal to the financial aid office.

1. Write a letter of appeal to the Director of Financial Aid explaining the circumstances and include supporting documentation.
2. Appeal must be made no later than two weeks prior to the semester aid would be affected.
3. Written notification will be made to the student.

**Refunds:** If a refund is due to a student for tuition and the student received financial aid, the refund will be returned to the financial aid programs. The refund amount to be returned to the financial aid programs is in accordance with Federal guidelines. The same formula will be applied to all Federal, State and Institutional aid. Refer to Refund Policy.

**Disbursements:** Scholarships, grants and loans will be disbursed as a credit to the student's account either by direct deposit or by endorsement of check(s). Direct deposit transactions will be made when the enrollment period commences and 100 percent refund period has expired.

**Package Plan:** Students enrolled in the package plan are eligible for 12-17.5 credit hours each regular semester (fall and spring). All other enrollees will be charged at the single credit hour rate.

**Dining Services**

Students living in on-campus housing are required to purchase a meal plan. Students living in Green Residence Hall are required to purchase a full meal plan and students living in upperclassman housing must purchase a smaller meal plan. In addition, all first-time, full-time freshmen who do not live on-campus are required to purchase a meal plan for their first two semesters of enrollment. **On-campus Housing**

The University provides residential housing for CBASE students in the suite-style Green Residence Hall, four apartment complexes and University-owned houses. Housing options and rates may be obtained by contacting the Residence Life Office at 316-295-5500 or reslife@friends.edu.

**Financial Aid**

**Federal Programs:** Federally funded programs are based on financial need and academic standards. Priority date for applying is March 1. Federal loan programs require borrowers to complete an entrance interview before loan funds are disbursed and an exit interview with the Financial Aid Office before leaving Friends University. Student borrowers discontinuing at least half-time study (6

cr. hrs.), graduating, transferring or withdrawing must complete an exit interview.

**State Programs:** All State funded programs are based on financial need and/or required GPA. Priority processing date is March 1.

**Friends University Institutional Programs:** Institutional programs are based on academics, participation and performance. Financial need is not an eligibility requirement. Exception: When Institutional scholarships are combined with Federal and/or State awards, the combination cannot be greater than the financial need as computed from the FAFSA. Priority date for applying is March 1.

**Application Procedures:**

1. Complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and a Friends University Student Data Form for all Federal grants and loans and Kansas Comprehensive Grant by the required priority dates.
  2. Complete the FAFSA with a Friends University Student Data Form and the State of Kansas Student Aid Application for State Scholar, Minority and Teacher scholarships by the required priority dates.
  3. Complete the Friends University Student Data Form for Institutional awards. See your department or division chair for renewal of all performance and department scholarships by the required priority dates.
  4. All Federal loans require a promissory note.
- Note: Application is required each year for all financial aid.*

**Repayment of Federal Funds**

For all students, if the student has received funding from Student Federal Assistance (Stafford Loans, PLUS loans, Perkins loans, SEOG, Pell Grant, National SMART Grant, Academic Competitiveness Grant, and TEACH Grant) and withdraws during a period of enrollment or payment period, the amount that has been earned up to that point is determined on a pro-rata basis. If you received less assistance than the amount that you earned, you may be able to receive those additional funds. If you received more assistance than you earned, the excess funds must be returned.

The amount of assistance that you earned is determined on a pro-rata basis (days completed divided by total days in the period of enrollment). If you completed 30 percent of your period of enrollment, you earn 30 percent of the assistance you were originally scheduled to receive. Once you have completed more than 60 percent of the period of enrollment, you earn all of your assistance.

If you received excess funds that must be returned, Friends University must return a portion of the excess equal to the lessor of:

- Your Institutional charges multiplied by the unearned percentage of your funds, or
- The entire amount of the excess funds.

If Friends University is not required to return

all of the excess funds, you must return the remaining amount. [ Any loan funds that you must return, you (or your parent for a PLUS loan) can repay in accordance with the terms of the promissory note.] That is, you make scheduled payments to the holder of the loan during a period of time.

If you are responsible for returning grant funds, you do not have to return the full amount. The law provides that you are not required to return 50 percent of the grant assistance that you received. Any amount that you do have to return is a grant overpayment, and you must make arrangements with the Friends University or the Department of Education to return the funds.

Friends University must return the unearned aid for which the school is responsible by repaying funds to the following sources, in the following order, up to the total net amount disbursed from each source: Unsubsidized FFEL Stafford Loan, Subsidized FFEL Stafford Loan, Perkins Loan, FFEL PLUS Loan, Pell Grant, FSEOG, SMART, ACG and other Title IV programs.

This Repayment Policy does not apply to Institutional, State or other non-federal funding sources.

**Refund Policy**

Refund schedule is included in student's registration statement.

The percent and procedure for refund is dependent on the date of official withdrawal and Federal regulations. Withdrawal is not official until it is received by the Office of the University Registrar. All refunds will be granted in full accordance with current Federal regulatory guidelines and University policy.

For all traditional students, Friends University will refund institutional charges including tuition and fees based on the following calculations: 100 percent refund will be rebated for withdrawals, which occur before the end of the 10 percent (in time) of the enrollment period; 50 percent refund will be rebated for withdrawals, which occur after 10 percent (in time) of the enrollment term and before the end of 25 percent (in time) of the enrollment term; 25 percent refund will be rebated for withdrawals, which occur after 25 percent (in time) of the enrollment term and before 50 percent (in time) of enrollment term. No refund will be rebated for withdrawals for any reason after 50 percent (in time) of the enrollment term. Room and board will be refunded based on pro-rata basis.

Repayment of Title IV funding will follow the process outlined in 'Repayment of Federal Funds'. All Institutional, State and other non-federal funding will be calculated using the refund policy stated above.

## ACADEMIC INFORMATION

**Changing Addresses and Names:** All students are expected to maintain and correct their local residence and permanent mailing address with the University and to report any change of address promptly to the Office of the University Registrar.

**Pass/Fail Courses:** Courses taken on a pass/fail basis are graded either “P” (for a grade of “D” or above) or “F”. “P” grades are not weighted into the GPA. Only junior and senior level students are permitted to take up to 12 hours of free electives pass/fail. Any pass/fail courses must be marked in the appropriate space on the enrollment card.

**Audit:** Students who audit a course attend the class sessions and may participate in class activities, but they do not take exams or complete out-of-class assignments, and they do not receive credit for the course. The course is recorded on the student’s transcript for 0 credit with a grade of “AU.” Hours taken for audit will be charged at one-half tuition (if outside the package price) and should be marked on the enrollment card as “AU”. Audit registration may not be converted to credit registration after the second week of a regular semester nor credit registration be converted to audit registration after the second week of a regular semester. Private lessons from the Fine Arts department are not available for audit.

**Cancelled Classes:** The University reserves the right to cancel, combine, change the time, day or location of any class without obligation. The University also reserves the right to change the instructor and/or instructional methodology without obligation. Schedule changes will be available at registration. It is the student’s responsibility to be aware of all schedule changes.

### **Request to Accept Other Institutional**

**Coursework:** Any student wishing to take classes at another institution to meet his/her degree requirements at Friends must complete an “Advance Request to Accept Other Institutional Coursework,” which may be picked up in the Office of the University Registrar.

**Credit by Examination:** Students who want to obtain credit by examination for a particular course must first see the instructor offering that course for permission to take the examination. If permission is given, he/she will be given a “Credit by Exam” form to be completed by the student, the instructor giving the exam, and the dean of the college (Business, Arts, Science and Education or Adult and Professional Studies). The dean will report the exam results to the Office of the University Registrar.

**Repeats:** A course previously taken for credit may be repeated. A student may not repeat a course more than twice (total of three attempts) in an effort to achieve a satisfactory grade. The most recent grade achieved by repeating a course is the grade utilized in student records and averages.

Repeated courses are not automatically identified by the Office of the University Registrar. You are responsible for filing a

Repeated Course Application form in the Office of the University Registrar in order to get your record appropriately adjusted.

**Courses by Special Arrangement:** (Independent Study, Reading, Special Problems, Conference, etc.) Any student wishing to enroll in a course not listed in the Schedule Book must complete a “Request for Special Course Arrangements” form, which may be picked up in the Office of the University Registrar. The form must be signed by the instructor, the student’s advisor, the division chair and the dean of their college.

**Overloads:** Any student enrolling for more than 17.5 hours must have the dean’s (College of Business, Arts, Science and Education) approval. Before signing your enrollment card, the dean must be presented with:

1. A copy of your worksheet showing GPA.
2. A note signed by your advisor indicating your capability to handle an overload.

**Transcripts:** To receive an official transcript of academic work at Friends University you must make a written request. The fee for a transcript is \$8 per copy. If same day processing is requested, the service fee is \$10 per copy. Faxed copies are \$12 (hard copy will also be mailed). Transcripts are not released if you have any indebtedness to the University.

### **Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act**

**Summary of the Friends University Policy:** The entire Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act can be found in the Friends University Catalog or on line at [www.friends.edu](http://www.friends.edu). The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974, as amended, sets forth requirements regarding the privacy of student records. FERPA governs the release of these educational records maintained by an educational institution and the access to these records. Educational records are any records maintained in print, computer, tape, film, handwriting or other medium related to a student, with the following exceptions:

- Records made by University employees that are kept in the sole possession of the maker.
- Employment records unless the employment is contingent on the fact that the employee is a student.
- Records maintained by University Security solely for law enforcement purposes.
- Records maintained for counseling or health purposes.
- Records that contain information relating to a person only after the individual is no longer a student at the University. Friends University accords all the rights under the law to students in attendance and former students. These rights are:
  - The right to inspect and review the student’s educational records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access.
  - The right to request the amendment of the student’s educational records that the student believes is inaccurate or misleading.

- The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the University to comply with the requirements of FERPA.
- The right to consent to disclosures of non-directory information contained in the student’s educational records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
- The right of currently enrolled students to request that all directory information be withheld. In order to exercise this right to privacy, a student must come to the Office of the University Registrar in Sumpter Hall and sign a “no release” form by the end of the first week of classes. Friends University assumes that failure on the part of any student to specifically request the withholding of directory information indicates individual approval for disclosure.

In accordance with FERPA, Friends University has designated the following student information as public or directory information and may provide this information to anyone: name, address(es), e-mail address(es), telephone number(s), dates of attendance, major field(s) of study, awards, honors (including Deans List, etc.), degree(s) conferred (including dates), past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors (heights/weights) of athletes and photographs.
