Classes are available to high school juniors and seniors who meet admission requirements of a 3.0 high school GPA and a letter of recommendation from a high school teacher or administrator.

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2017 Early College course descriptions

PSYC 100 – Introduction to Psychology (3 credit hours)

Designed to give the student a comprehensive overview of the subject, which includes philosophies, theories, developmental aspects and understandings of the psychological make-up of the human organism. (Meets Perspectives and Foundations General Education Requirement)

SPCH 100 – Public Speaking (3 credit hours)

Designed to help the student to speak effectively in public. The student studies models and presents several kinds of speeches. Major concentration on the essentials of effective speaking through bodily behavior on the platform and techniques for improving the speaking voice. (Meets Competency General Education Requirement)

2017 Early College Scholars Program

High school junior and senior students with a cumulative high school grade point average of 3.5 or higher are eligible to apply for one of the following two courses:

ENGL 215 – Introduction to Literature (3 credit hours)

Introduction to Literature is a survey course that examines selected literary works from fiction, poetry, drama and non-fiction. (Meets the Literature General Education Requirement)

Early deadline: Students enrolling in the Summer Scholars Introduction to Literature course must enroll prior to April 1. A reading list will be provided by April 1 to students enrolled with expectations of identified readings being completed prior to the first day of class.

HSVA 210 – Introduction to Human Services (3 credit hours)

Exploration of social welfare systems as a social institution. A functional as well as philosophical look at the development and present status of social welfare and how it helps individuals, families and groups enhance or restore capacities for social functioning. *This experiential course will involve learning activities around the city of Wichita.*

Optional internship credit: Students enrolling in the Summer Scholarship Introduction to Human Services course will have the option of enrolling in an additional 3-credit-hour Psychology Internship to be completed throughout the summer or possibly into the fall semester. An additional credit-hour fee would apply to internship credits.

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
